**ENHANCING THE CONTINUING PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT OF FILIPINO PROFESSIONALS AS AN INTEGRAL COMPONENT OF CAREER PROGRESSION AND SPECIALIZATION PROGRAMS, AND APPROPRIATING FUNDS THEREFOR, AMENDING FOR THE PURPOSE REPUBLIC ACT NO. 10912, OTHERWISE KNOWN AS THE “CONTINUING PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT ACT OF 2016”**

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Philippines in Congress assembled:*

1 **SECTION. 1.** Section 3 of Republic Act No. 10912 is hereby amended to read as follows:

8 (E) CAREER PROGRESSION REFERS TO THE PROCESS OF  
9 DEVELOPING OR MOVING TOWARDS A MORE ADVANCED STATE IN  
10 A PERSON’S QUALIFICATIONS, JOB, TITLE, POSITION, OR  
11 PROFESSION. IT OUTLINES THE ROUTE THAT ONE MAY FOLLOW IN  
12 ORDER TO REACH IDENTIFIED CAREER DEVELOPMENT GOALS;

13  
14 (F) CAREER PROGRESSION AND SPECIALIZATION PROGRAM AND  
15 CREDIT ACCUMULATION AND TRANSFER SYSTEM (CPSP-CATS)  
16 COMMITTEE REFERS TO THE BODY THAT PROVIDES TECHNICAL  
17 SUPPORT TO THE CONTINUING PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT  
18 (CPD) COUNCIL AND THE BOARD OF EACH PROFESSION IN THE  
19 FORMULATION AND IMPLEMENTATION OF THE CPSP-CATS, SUCH  
20 AS PROGRAM AND LEARNING OUTCOMES FOR EVERY IDENTIFIED  
21 QUALIFICATION TITLE OF THE PROFESSION AND RECOMMENDS  
22 TO THE COUNCIL THE FORMULATION AND IMPLEMENTATION OF  
23 THE NECESSARY PROGRAMS AND POLICIES TO BE IMPLEMENTED  
24 BY THE CPSP-CATS;

25  
26 (G) CERTIFICATE OF REGISTRATION REFERS TO THE DOCUMENT  
27 ISSUED BY THE PROFESSIONAL REGULATION COMMISSION (PRC)  
28 SIGNIFYING THAT THE PERSON NAMED THEREIN HAS COMPLIED

1 WITH ALL THE LEGAL AND PROCEDURAL REQUIREMENTS FOR  
2 SUCH ISSUANCE, INCLUDING, IN APPROPRIATE CASES, PASSING  
3 THE LICENSURE EXAMINATION OR REGISTRATION WITHOUT  
4 EXAMINATION;

5  
6 [(e) Competence refers to an ability that extends beyond the possession of  
7 knowledge and skills, which include cognitive, functional, personal and ethical  
8 competence;]

9  
10 (H) COMPETENCY REFERS TO THE CAPABILITY TO APPLY OR USE A  
11 SET OF KNOWLEDGE, SKILLS AND ABILITIES REQUIRED TO  
12 SUCCESSFULLY PERFORM AND IMPLEMENT CRITICAL WORK  
13 FUNCTIONS OR TASKS IN A DEFINED WORK SETTING;

14  
15 [(f)] (I) Continuing Professional Development [or] (CPD) refers to the  
16 [inculcation] ACQUISITION of advanced knowledge, skills and ethical values  
17 in a post-licensure specialization or in an inter- or multidisciplinary field of  
18 study, for assimilation into professional practice, [self-directed research and/  
19 or lifelong learning;”

20  
21 [(g)] (J) CPD Council refers to a body created to promote and ensure the  
22 continuous improvement of professionals, in accordance with national,  
23 regional and international standards of practice;

24  
25 [(h)] (K) CPD credit unit refers to the value of an amount of learning that can  
26 be transferred to a qualification achieved from formal [, informal or] AND  
27 nonformal learning setting [,] wherein credits can be accumulated to  
28 predetermined levels for the award of a qualification;

29  
30 [(i)] (L) CPD Program refers to a set of STRUCTURED learning activities  
31 accredited by the CPD Council such as seminars, workshops, technical lectures  
32 or subject matter meetings, nondegree training lectures and scientific meetings,  
33 [modules, tours and visits,] which equip [the] professionals with advanced  
34 knowledge, skills and values in A specialized or [in an] inter- or  
35 multidisciplinary field of study[, self-directed research and /or lifelong  
36 learning];

37  
38 [(j)] (M) CPD Provider refers to a natural or juridical person accredited by the  
39 CPD Council to conduct CPD Programs;

40  
41 (N) CREDIT ACCUMULATION AND TRANSFER SYSTEM FOR  
42 PROFESSIONALS REFERS TO A LEARNER-CENTERED SYSTEM  
43 WHICH FACILITATES THE RECOGNITION, ACCUMULATION,  
44 TRANSFER, AND MOBILITY OF THE WORK EXPERIENCE OR WORK  
45 CREDENTIALS OF PROFESSIONALS AND THE ACHIEVEMENT OF  
46 LEARNING OUTCOMES TO ENABLE THEM TO ACQUIRE A

1 PROFESSIONAL QUALIFICATION OR ANY OTHER FORM OF  
2 RECOGNITION IN ANY AREA OR FIELD OF EXPERTISE;

3  
4 (O) CREDITS REFER TO THE VALUE GIVEN TO A LEARNING  
5 OUTCOME OR A PACKAGE OF LEARNING OUTCOMES;

6  
7 [(k)] (P) Formal learning refers to educational arrangements such as curricular  
8 qualifications and teaching-learning requirements that take place in education  
9 and training institutions recognized by relevant national authorities, and which  
10 lead to THE CONFERMENT OF diplomas and qualifications;

11  
12 [(l)] (I) Informal learning refers to learning that occurs in daily life assessed,  
13 through the recognition, validation and accreditation process, and which can  
14 contribute to a qualification; ]

15  
16 [(m)] (Q) Learning outcomes refer to what a learner can be expected to know,  
17 understand [and/] or demonstrate as a result of a learning experience;

18  
19 [(n)] (R) Lifelong learning refers to learning activities undertaken throughout  
20 life for the development of competencies and qualifications of the professional;

21  
22 [(o)] (S) Nonformal learning refers to [learning that has been acquired in  
23 addition or alternatively to formal learning, which may be structured and made  
24 more flexible according to educational and training arrangements]  
25 STRUCTURED ACTIVITIES WHICH HAVE LEARNING PROCESSES  
26 AND PRE-DETERMINED OUTCOMES SUCH AS A HIGHER  
27 EDUCATION DEGREE OR DIPLOMA OR CERTIFICATE COURSES,  
28 INSTITUTION OR COMPANY-SPONSORED TRAINING PROGRAMS  
29 AND SEMINARS, SPECIALTY TRAINING, AND ONLINE LEARNING  
30 ACTIVITIES THAT ARE DELIVERED ACCORDING TO APPROVED

10 to qualifications and assist professionals to move easily [and readily] between  
11 the different education and training sectors, and between these sectors, and  
12 the labor market, through the Philippine Credit Transfer System;

14 [(r)] (W) Philippine Qualifications Framework [or] (PQF) refers to the quality  
15 assured national system for the development, recognition and award of  
16 qualifications at defined levels, based on standards of knowledge, skills and

28 QUALIFICATION CODE, THE INSTRUMENT AND DATE OF  
29 AUTHORIZATION;

31 (Y) PORTABILITY REFERS TO THE ABILITY OF ENABLING  
32 LEARNERS TO TRANSFER CREDITS OF QUALIFICATIONS FROM  
33 ONE LEARNING INSTITUTION OR EMPLOYER TO ANOTHER.  
34 HOWEVER, SUCH TRANSFER AND RECOGNITION OF SKILLS ARE  
35 NOT AUTOMATIC TRANSFER OF CREDITS TO QUALIFICATIONS;

37 (Z) POSITION REFERS TO A SET OF DUTIES AND  
38 RESPONSIBILITIES, ASSIGNED OR DELEGATED BY COMPETENT  
39 AUTHORITY AND PERFORMED BY AN INDIVIDUAL EITHER ON  
40 FULL-TIME OR PART-TIME BASIS;

41  
42 [(s)] (AA) Prior learning refers to a person’s skills, knowledge and  
43 competencies that have been acquired through work experience, training,  
44 independent study, volunteer activities and hobbies, that may be applied for  
45 academic credit, as a requirement of a training program or for occupational  
46 certification;

2 [(t)] (BB) Professional refers to a person who is registered and licensed to  
3 practice a regulated profession in the Philippines and who holds a valid  
4 Certificate of Registration and Professional Identification Card (PIC) from  
5 the Professional Regulation Commission (PRC);

7 (CC) PROFESSIONAL IDENTIFICATION CARD REFERS TO THE  
8 CARD BEARING THE REGISTRATION NUMBER, DATES OF  
9 ISSUANCE AND EXPIRY, AND IMPORTANT INFORMATION ON  
10 PROFESSIONAL PRACTICE, DULY SIGNED BY THE PRC  
11 CHAIRPERSON AND ISSUED TO A REGISTERED PROFESSIONAL  
12 UPON PAYMENT OF THE PRESCRIBED FEE, AND WHICH IS VALID  
13 FOR THREE (3) YEARS;

15 [(u)] (DD) Qualification refers to a status gained after a person has been  
16 assessed to have achieved learning outcomes or competencies in accordance  
17 with the SET standards [specified for a qualification title, and is proven by a  
18 document issued by a recognized agency or body];

20 (EE) QUALIFICATION FRAMEWORK CREDIT REFERS TO A  
21 MEASUREMENT OF COMPREHENSION IN A SPECIALIZATION  
22 PROGRAM. IT SPECIFIES THE PROFICIENCY LEVEL TO BE  
23 ACQUIRED BY A LEARNER IN ORDER TO EARN THE RELEVANT  
24 QUALIFICATION SOUGHT;

26 (FF) QUALIFICATION TITLE REFERS TO AN AWARD AFTER  
27 COMPETENCY ASSESSMENT ENTERED INTO THE PhQuaR. THE  
28 CONFERMENT IS GIVEN TO A PROFESSIONAL BY THE PRC AND  
29 THE PRBs;  
30

31 [(v)] (GG) Quality assurance refers to planned and systematic processes that  
32 provide confidence in the design, delivery and award of qualifications within  
33 an education and training system, and [is a component of quality management  
34 that is focused on ensuring that quality requirements will be fulfilled] A  
35 COMPONENT OF QUALITY MANAGEMENT THAT IS FOCUSED ON  
36 PROVIDING CONFIDENCE THAT QUALITY REQUIREMENTS WILL  
37 BE FULFILLED. QUALITY ASSURANCE ENSURES THAT  
38 STAKEHOLDERS' INTERESTS AND INVESTMENTS IN ANY  
39 ACCREDITED PROGRAM ARE PROTECTED;

41 [(w)] Self-directed learning refers to learning activities such as online training,  
42 local/international seminars/nondegree courses, institution/company-

44 accreditation but may be applied for and awarded CPD units by the respective

1 (HH) SPECIALIZATION REFERS TO THE FIELD OF PRACTICE OF A  
2 PROFESSION FOR A PARTICULAR AREA OF KNOWLEDGE OR THE  
3 PROCESS OF BECOMING AN EXPERT IN A PARTICULAR FIELD OF  
4 PROFESSIONAL PRACTICE; AND

5  
6 (II) SPECIALTY TRAINING REFERS TO A NONDEGREE  
7 POSTGRADUATE STRUCTURED TRAINING PROGRAM WITH  
8 ASSESSMENT MECHANISMS, CONDUCTED BY ANY COMPANY,  
9 PUBLIC OR PRIVATE, OR HIGHER EDUCATION INSTITUTION.”

11 **SEC. 2.** Section 5 of Republic Act No. 10912 is hereby amended to read as follows:

29 (C) PROFESSIONALS WHO ARE REQUIRED TO APPLY FOR  
30 ACCREDITATION PRIOR TO THE PRACTICE OF THEIR PROFESSION  
31 AS PROVIDED IN THE RELEVANT PROFESSIONAL REGULATORY  
32 LAWS (PRL), SHALL COMPLY WITH THE REQUIRED CPD COURSES;

33  
34 (D) PROFESSIONALS WHO WISH TO BE ISSUED A CERTIFICATE OF  
35 GOOD STANDING (COGS) BY THEIR AIPO AS INDICATED IN THEIR  
36 PRL, SHALL COMPLY WITH THE CPD REQUIREMENT, WHICH IN NO  
37 CASE SHALL BE LESS THAN FORTY-FIVE (45) CREDIT UNITS; AND

38  
39 (E) DURING A PANDEMIC, STATE OF CALAMITY OR NATIONAL  
40 EMERGENCY, THE PRC MAY TEMPORARILY SUSPEND THE  
41 COMPLIANCE PERIOD FOR CPD REQUIREMENTS INDEFINITELY  
42 OR EXTEND THE END OF THE SAID COMPLIANCE PERIOD TO THE  
43 EQUIVALENT DURATION OF THE PANDEMIC, CALAMITY OR  
44 NATIONAL EMERGENCY.

45  
46 **SEC. 4.** A new Section 10-A is hereby inserted to read as follows:

2 “SEC. 10-A. EXEMPTIONS FROM CPD REQUIREMENTS. - THE  
3 NUMBER OF REQUIRED CREDIT UNITS PER COMPLIANCE SHALL

6 (A) NEWLY LICENSED OR REGISTERED PROFESSIONALS ON THE  
7 FIRST RENEWAL OF THEIR PIC WITHIN THE FIRST FOUR (4) YEARS  
8 AFTER OBTAINING THEIR LICENSE;

10 (B) OFWS, AS DEFINED IN SECTION 2, LETTER (U) OF THIS ACT;  
11 AND

12  
13 (C) SENIOR CITIZENS WHO ARE NOT ENGAGED IN THE PRACTICE  
14 OF THEIR PROFESSION, AS DEFINED UNDER THEIR RESPECTIVE  
15 REGULATORY LAWS.”

16  
17 **SEC. 5.** Section 12 of Republic Act No. 10912 is hereby amended to read as follows:

19 “SEC. 12. *Career Progression and Specialization PROGRAM AND CREDIT*  
20 *ACCUMULATION AND TRANSFER SYSTEM.* – THE CPSP-CATS SHALL  
21 BE SUPERVISED AND ADMINISTERED BY THE CPSP-CATS  
22 COMMITTEE WHICH SHALL PROVIDE TECHNICAL SUPPORT TO  
23 THE CPD COUNCIL AND THE BOARD OF EACH PROFESSION IN

37 REGULATION OF THE PRC.

39 FOR THIS PURPOSE, THE PRC AND THE PRBs SHALL CREATE THE  
40 CPSP-CATS COMMITTEE FOR EACH PROFESSION TO ASSIST THE  
41 CPD COUNCIL AND THE PRBs IN THE IMPLEMENTATION OF CPSP-  
42 CATS.

43  
44 THE PRC [and], the PRBs AND THE CPSP-CATS COMMITTEE, in  
45 consultation with the RESPECTIVE AIPO/APO, the Civil Service  
46 Commission (CSC), THE DEPARTMENT OF LABOR AND

1 EMPLOYMENT (DOLE), other concerned government agencies,  
2 EMPLOYERS' BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONAL ORGANIZATIONS

17 (B) CPD UNITS EARNED SHALL BE AN UPGRADE TOWARDS  
18 MOVEMENT IN THE PQF QUALIFICATION LEVEL AS IT RESULTS IN

20 CAREER PROGRESSION AND SPECIALIZATION;

22 (C) THE PRBs AND THE CPSP-CATS COMMITTEE, TOGETHER WITH  
23 THE ACCREDITED SPECIALTY SOCIETY OR SIMILAR

30 REQUIREMENTS AND COMPLIANCE WITH OTHER

32 QUALIFICATION OR TITLE COMMENSURATE TO THE PQF  
33 QUALIFICATION LEVEL, WHICH SHALL BE INDICATED AS  
34 ADDITIONAL INFORMATION IN THE PIC;

36 (E) PhQuaR AS LINKED TO THE ASEAN QUALIFICATIONS  
37 REFERENCE FRAMEWORK AND THE PRC SHALL MAINTAIN A  
38 REGISTRY OF QUALIFICATIONS TITLES FOR EVERY PROFESSION;  
39 AND  
40

41 (F) PROFESSIONALS WHO ARE COVERED BY MRAs AND OTHER  
42 INTERNATIONAL AGREEMENTS WHO DESIRE TO BE RECOGNIZED  
43 OR REGISTERED UNDER THESE AGREEMENTS SHALL COMPLY  
44 WITH THE MANDATORY CPD AND CPS REQUIREMENTS.”

46 **SEC. 6.** Section 13 of Republic Act No. 10912 is hereby amended to read as follows:

14       (B) PRIVATE FIRMS SHALL SUPPORT THE CPD COMPLIANCE OF  
15       PROFESSIONALS UNDER THEIR EMPLOY. NOTHING IN THIS  
16       PROVISION SHALL PREVENT, DIMINISH, OR OTHERWISE REVOKE  
17       EXISTING COMPANY POLICY MORE FAVORABLE TO THE  
18       EMPLOYEE;

20       (C) THE RESPECTIVE CPD COUNCILS SHALL DEVISE  
21       MECHANISMS FOR PROVIDING DISCOUNTS TO SENIOR CITIZENS  
22       IN THE FEES TO BE CHARGED FOR ATTENDANCE IN CPD  
23       SEMINARS, TRAININGS, AND SIMILAR PROGRAMS, SPECIFICALLY  
24       THOSE ENGAGED IN THE PRACTICE OF THEIR PROFESSIONS AND  
25       WHO ARE REQUIRED TO COMPLY WITH THE CPD REQUIREMENTS;

26  
27       (D) ALL PROFESSIONALS SHALL BE GIVEN CPD MANDATORY PAID  
28       LEAVE IN SUFFICIENT NUMBER OF DAYS NECESSARY TO COMPLY  
29       WITH THE REQUIREMENTS OF THIS ACT, TO BE CHARGED TO  
30       THEIR EXISTING LEAVE CREDITS; AND

31       (E) IN THE PROCESSING OF DOCUMENTS FOR RENEWAL OF PIC,  
32       IN ACCORDANCE WITH THIS ACT, NO FEES SHALL BE REQUIRED  
33       IN ADDITION TO WHAT THE PRC ALREADY REQUIRES FOR PIC  
34       RENEWAL, IF ANY, PRIOR TO THE PASSAGE OF THIS ACT.”

37       **SEC. 7.** Section 14 of Republic Act No. 10912 is hereby amended to read as follows:

31 *NO OR VERY LOW COST TO PROFESSIONALS. THEY MAY CREATE*  
32 *MECHANISMS WHERE QUALIFIED PROFESSIONALS FROM*  
33 *OUTSIDE THE GOVERNMENT AGENCIES OR PRIVATE*  
34 *COMPANIES MAY BE ALLOWED TO JOIN THE SAID SEMINAR,*

19 **SEC. 11.** Sections 16, 17, 18, and 19 of Republic Act No. 10912 are hereby renumbered as  
20 Sections 17, 18, 19, and 20, respectively.

22 **SEC. 12.** *Separability Clause.* - If any part or provision of this Act is declared invalid or  
23 unconstitutional, the other parts or provisions not affected shall remain in full force and effect.  
24

25 **SEC. 13.** *Repealing Clause.* - All laws, decrees, executive orders and other administrative  
26 issuances or parts thereof, which are inconsistent with the provisions of this Act, are repealed  
27 or modified accordingly.  
28

29 **SEC. 14.** *Effectivity.* - This Act shall take effect fifteen (15) days after its publication in the  
30 *Official Gazette* or in a newspaper of general circulation.

**OBJECTIVES:**

- To enhance and strengthen the continuing professional development (CPD) of the country's professionals to improve their skills and make them at par with professionals from other countries
- To address the limitations of Republic Act. No. 10912, otherwise known as the "Continuing Professional Development Act of 2016"
- To exempt from CPD requirements certain categories or groups of professionals

**KEY PROVISIONS:**

- Makes the CPD a mandatory requirement in the updating and upgrading of knowledge, skills and values and competencies or titles of all registered and licensed professionals under the regulation of the Professional Regulation Commission (PRC) and as one of the main objectives of the Philippine Qualifications Framework (PQF) under Republic Act No. 10968 (Philippine Qualifications Framework Act)
- Mandates that all professionals shall be required to obtain forty-five (45) CPD credit units every four (4) years which shall be deemed as the compliance period
- Exempts some professionals from the CPD requirements, such as the newly licensed or registered professionals on the first renewal of their Professional Identification Card within the first four (4) years after obtaining their license; Overseas Filipino Workers and senior citizens who are not engaged in the practice of their profession, as defined under their respective regulatory laws
- Provides that professionals who are covered by Mutual Recognition Arrangements (MRAs) who may wish that their profession and qualifications be internationally recognized, shall comply with the required CPD units as prescribed in the MRAs which in no case shall be less than forty-five (45) credit units
- Mandates that the CPD shall be a beneficial and integrated component in the upgrading of qualification standards and title towards Career Progression and Specialization Program (CPSP) and Credit Accumulation and Transfer System (CATS) and for this purpose, the PRC and the Professional Regulatory Boards shall create the CPSP-CATS committee for each profession to assist the CPD council and the PRBs in the implementation of CPSP-CATS
- Grants the PRC the authority, during a pandemic, state of calamity, or national emergency, to temporarily suspend the compliance period for CPD requirements indefinitely or extend the end of the said compliance period to the equivalent duration of the pandemic, state of calamity or national emergency
- Directs the various government departments and agencies, and private companies, in consultation and coordination with the PRC, to establish a mechanism whereby they shall provide professionals under their jurisdiction, with free or inexpensive seminars, workshops, online and similar training programs, to earn CPD

credit units, with no or very low cost to the professionals and that they may create mechanisms where qualified professionals from outside the government department or agency or private company may be allowed to join the said seminar, workshop and online or similar training program and earn CPD credit units

- Orders all government agencies, including government-owned and controlled corporations, to include in their annual budget an allocation for the conduct of free trainings and seminars for their professional employees
- Directs concerned government agencies, public higher education institutions, and other public institutions to provide full funding for the CPD compliance of professionals employed by them
- Mandates that the in-service trainings for teachers being implemented by the Department of Education, which are structured and with clear-cut learning processes and outcomes, shall be considered as part of the CPD Program
- Provides administrative penalties for failure to implement properly the CPD program subject to certain conditions
